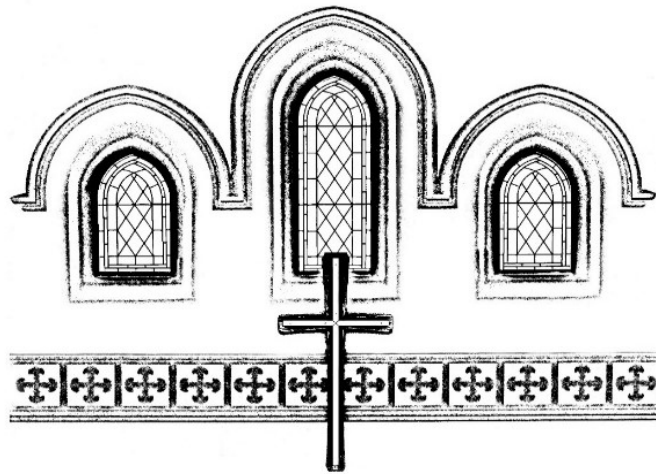

from our Minister...

Dear Friends,

As Easter approaches, I want to share with you something that is very important to me about the resurrection faith. It's so critical to me that you will doubtless hear me referring to this at other times as well.

If you have been at worship regularly, you will have heard me say that one of my previous appointments was a complete disaster. It was a mismatch between what the churches wanted and what I was able to offer. The effect on me – on us, indeed – was terrible. I'll spare you the gory details.

During those dark days, one book just about kept my head above water. It was Bishop Tom Wright's 'Surprised by Hope', in which he explains how the resurrection of Jesus is the foundation of all our hope as Christians.

In the book, Wright spends a lot of time writing about the Apostle Paul's famous chapter concerning resurrection - 1 Corinthians 15. Within that chapter, he concentrates a lot on the final verse, number 58:

Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labour in the Lord is not in vain.

Some of us might expect a chapter on the resurrection to end with a glorious statement about heaven and the new creation, but no - Paul brings it back to the here and now. Because the resurrection is the first fruits of God making all things new, all our work for the Lord is taken up and used in building for the kingdom of God. None of it is worthless. It will all be used somehow.

Therefore, when what I offered in that appointment was not received by several people, I could at least know that God would still use my offerings for his kingdom. I didn't know how, and in all honesty I still don't. But I believe he will.

I share this with you for two reasons. Firstly, for anyone reading this who feels discouraged in their life and faith. I want you to learn, as I did, that the resurrection means there is hope, and what you do in faith for Jesus will prove worthwhile.

Secondly, I share this for those of us who think that the resurrection means we can sit back and think of heaven. Tom Wright puts the challenge like this: *'Jesus is risen, and we've got a job to do.'*

Let's work for him in hope.

Methodist Church Gaza Appeal



The Methodist Church in Britain has launched an appeal to support the emergency work being carried out in Gaza by the Methodist Liaison Office's partners.

The partners' work focuses on helping civilians in Gaza with medical, dental and mental health issues and offering them financial support. Speaking about the war in the Gaza Strip, which is 25 miles long and houses 2.3 million people, the President and Vice-President expressed their deep horror at the physical and psychological impact the continued violence is having on families:

"The scale of the destruction and tragic loss of life in so short a space of time is incomparable...with... any other conflict in recent times. We grieve for all lives lost on 7th October and in the subsequent fighting. There is no justification for such widespread killing of tens of thousands of innocent people and we are gravely concerned for the entire population of the Gaza strip."

The Methodist Liaison Office (MLO) supports several partners in the region, many of whom have had to adapt the support they offer in light of the Israeli Defence Forces' military campaign.

The **Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees (DSPR)** is part of the **Near East Council of Churches (NECC)** and the Jerusalem **Princess Basma Centre** had just opened a clinic in Gaza when the violence started; they are working in the most difficult of circumstances.

The DSPR-NECC says the situation in Gaza is a disaster beyond belief and the impact on people is catastrophic. They are working with some of the most vulnerable civilians and in central and south Gaza their clinic is one of only four centres that continue to operate: they are able to see around 500 people a day. Their mental health support reaches children aged between five and nine through open days and other activities in different shelters and schools.

The DSPR-NECC wants to expand this work to help more children and women, offering mental health first aid to those traumatised by the

conflict. The DSPR-NECC has also given grants of around £150 to families to buy water, food and other essential supplies.

Members of the Christian community are taking refuge in Gaza's two churches: the Holy Family Catholic Church and the St Porphyrius Orthodox Church. The DSPR-NECC is supporting these people with food, medical supplies, fuel for the electrical generator and hygiene products.

The Jerusalem Princess Basma



Centre works with children with disabilities and their families. It opened a new rehabilitation clinic in Gaza so families do not have to make the difficult journey to Jerusalem for treatment. Their occupational therapist, Al-Zahraa is sheltering in a school in Rafah where 3000 people are living in

crowded and restricted accommodation, and their social worker, Musa is based in a church in Gaza City where a community of sisters run a home for 40 children with disabilities. Staff specialise in occupational therapy, physiotherapy, and speech and language therapy; they are making short videos to support and coach staff in Gaza on how to treat acute and chronic disabilities.

SAINT OLAV



Many of you will know Saint Olav's church in North Street Chichester which is now a Christian book shop. Saint Olav's church is the oldest surviving church building in Chichester city centre but why is it named after a Norwegian saint?

Its dedication suggests a Scandinavian link and implies that it was not founded before the mid - 11th century. The church is named after Saint Olav, King of Norway, who converted to Christianity.

The founders of the church were likely to be Scandinavian merchants and one, Ketel Esterman, owned nearby houses.



Olav was the son of King Harald Grenske of Norway. He spent most of his youth as a Norse raider until 1010 when he was baptised at Rouen. In 1013 he journeyed to England and offered his services to King Ethelred against the invading Danes. Returning home in 1015, after succeeding to the throne, he embarked on a war to free Norway from the domination of the Danes and Swedes and defeated Earl Sweyn in 1016. He immediately requested that missionaries be sent from England to advance the Christianisation of Norway.

Olav was slain in battle in 1031. Although not considered holy during his lifetime, Olav was soon revered after death owing to reports of miracles occurring at his tomb. He was greatly respected as a champion of Norwegian independence and his shrine became the foundation of the cathedral of Trondheim which was a popular place of pilgrimage during the Middle Ages.

He is the patron saint of Norway.

St. Olav's church still holds an annual Eucharist service on 29th July which is Saint Olav's day.

MCH Community Lunch



In the last issue we reported the success of the first lunch in the Church Hall on 15th January. We are delighted to tell you that it has gone from strength to strength, with new guests coming along every week.

We have two volunteer teams – our Kitchen Team does a splendid job of preparing and cooking a range of appetising dishes, with a new menu every week and three choices each for mains and desserts. As numbers continue to increase we are exploring the option of joining UK Harvest to source some of our fresh fruits and vegetables.

Our Front of House Team welcomes on average around 20 guests each week (after our first ten weeks we already have an amazing total of 57 guests on our register). It's a great job for volunteers – following initial setup, most of us just sit with guests and chat over tea or coffee until the meal is ready to be served! Our guests constantly tell us how much they appreciate the warm welcome, friendly atmosphere and tasty homecooked meals.

This is a fabulous way to share God's love with members of our community. If it sounds like something you would enjoy as a guest or a volunteer, please just come along on a Monday and see for yourself – every Monday (excluding bank holidays) from 11.30 with meals served at 12.30. As you know, the refreshments and meal are entirely free and no booking is required.

“IN TOUCH” February 2023

The top issue discussed at the Midhurst Community Forums in May and November last year was loneliness and isolation. Connecting to people is one of the “Five Steps to Wellbeing” recommended by MIND as we all want to feel valued for who we are.

So (Keeping) “In Touch” is being set up as a telephone buddying service, whereby volunteer callers undertake to make 3 phone calls a week to people who would welcome a friendly chat.

We are now recruiting volunteer callers and would particularly welcome those in the rural parishes around Midhurst (e.g. Stedham, Rogate, Harting, Milland, Fernhurst)

There has to be some necessary admin around this to protect both the caller and the recipient of the call. So volunteer callers are asked:

- to complete a simple application form now
- to sign a confidentiality form (to avoid gossiping)
- to agree to being DBSd (safeguarding both caller and called)
- to attend a briefing session (about Do’s and don’ts)
- to committing to make 3 phone calls a week

We will then link volunteer callers to those wishing to hear a friendly voice each week. The calls can of course be made from home.

This is a lovely opportunity for those who may themselves not be able to get out much to make the calls, and thereby to provide a valuable service to others. We hope to start “In Touch” calls in early April.

Eco Church

Here are two issues which are important to the environment, this spring:

1. We have all heard of this idea before but if you have a lawn give the mowing a break for the month of May.

Apart from avoiding the work of mowing the lawn you will be helping pollinating insects as, by letting the lawn grow taller, wild flowers will have a chance to bloom providing essential food sources for bees, butterflies, moths and other pollinators crucial to our ecosystem. A longer lawn also provides shelter and nesting sites for birds, hedgehogs and other small mammals.

The health of the soil will improve as long grass acts as a natural mulch, helping to retain moisture and suppressing weeds, so leading to healthier, more fertile soil. A month without lawn mowing will give us time to do other much-needed jobs in the garden and the chance to sit in the garden and enjoy being out in the fresh air!!

You can even extend the period of not mowing or mow less often throughout the growing season.

2. Buying fewer clothes also helps the environment.

By buying less clothing, we consume less of the resources used in their production. If we buy better-quality clothing that lasts longer, less waste is created. If you buy “fast fashion” ie cheaper clothing, more of it ends up in landfill. Think twice before you throw your clothes out.

Buying clothing in charity shops is a good form of recycling - diverting clothes from landfill and giving them longer use.

As well as the energy and chemicals used to create new clothes, washing our clothes releases 500,000 tons of microfibres into the ocean each year - equivalent to 50 billion plastic bottles.

It is shocking to think that for every 10 items of clothing we buy our grandparents bought only 2.

Eco Church

It is now an option for us to become an Eco Church by registering with a charity called "A Rocha" which would help us to go green in all areas of church life.

This is something which other Churches in our circuit are already engaged with and could be of great benefit to us if we join by encouraging us to explore how to take better care of God's earth in our church life, through the framework of Eco Church.

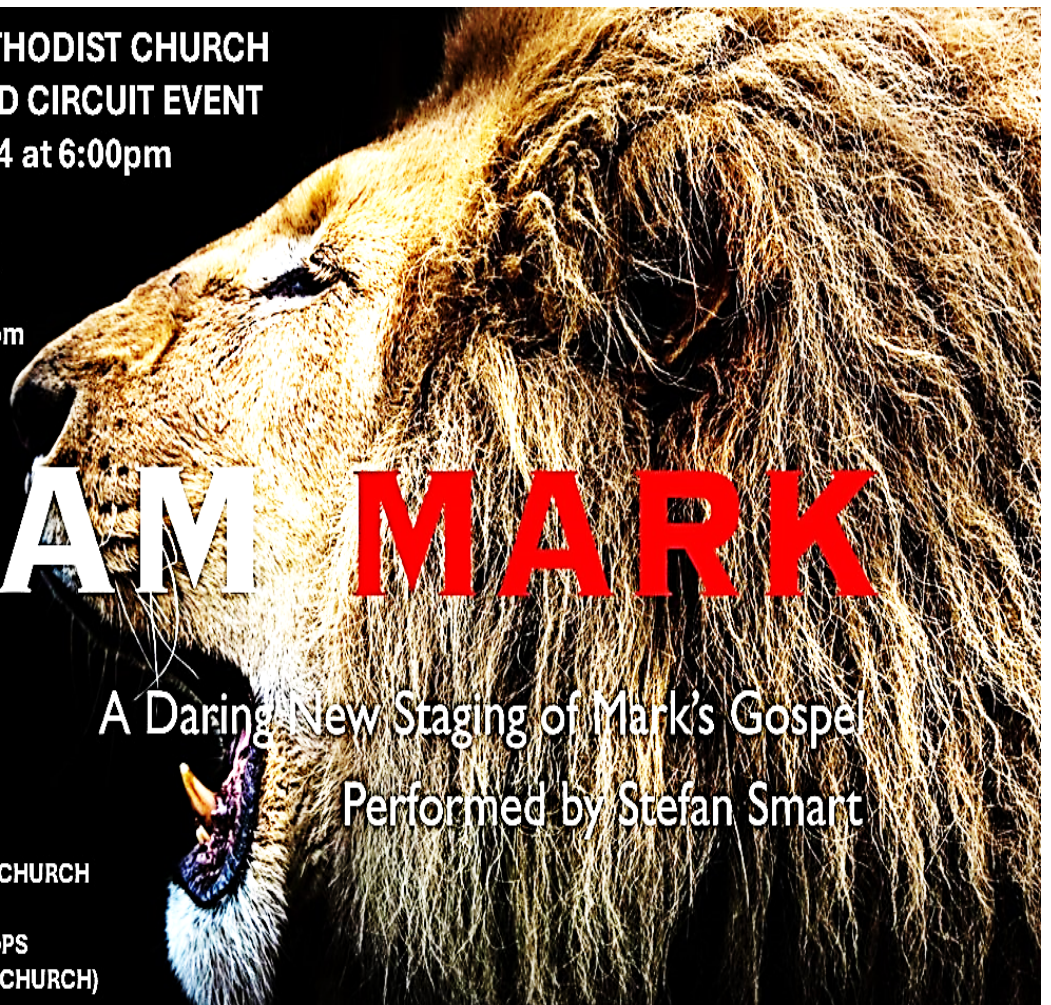

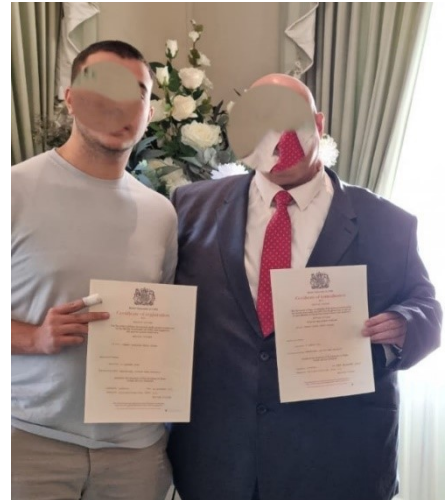




City of Sanctuary

Latest Information from Sanctuary in Chichester

Two Syrian refugees who arrived seven years ago and have been helped by Sanctuary in Chichester recently attained **British citizenship**. Mr A S said, *“I am extremely happy and pleased that my family and I have become members of the Great British community. I hope my family and I will be active citizens serving and respecting the Kingdom.”*



Community support is important in aiding refugees and asylum-seekers to integrate into local society and build new lives. SiC provides this type of support through volunteers, helping individuals navigate the challenges of settling in a new country. Their family’s journey also demonstrates their resilience and determination in seeking a safe and stable life here.

The **Mayor and Mayoress of Chichester visited Chichester Park Hotel** in December to get an understanding of the support systems that were being established and the care that was being provided. The visit highlighted the collaborative efforts of the hotel staff, volunteers, and local organisations, like Sanctuary in Chichester and Children on the Edge, in creating a welcoming and supportive environment for the refugees. It was a reaffirmation of the community’s dedication to helping these individuals and families as they start their new lives in the UK.

Sanctuary in Chichester’s **Pathways to Independence (PTI)** programme empowers beneficiaries, with significant results through focusing on volunteering, employment, and skill-building workshops. Volunteering: The PTI program has successfully supported sixteen beneficiaries into volunteering posts. Volunteering has an important rôle in enhancing participants’ mental health and self-esteem as well

as experience of the workplace culture in the UK and learning new skills.

Entrepreneurial Venture: One couple has been supported in becoming entrepreneurs, launching 'E & J Syrian Cuisine'. Late in 2023, they expanded their venture to market stalls and have aspirations to open a restaurant.

Employment Support and Training: PTI has provided comprehensive employment support, including composing CVs, job search assistance, and linking beneficiaries with the National Careers Service. Refugees face huge barriers to employment but this work has had tangible results, achieving employment in security firms and care homes.

Education and Workshops: including Driving Theory English Lessons, an IT Course for Beginners, a Volunteering Workshop at the Hotel, and a Volunteering & Employment Networking Event

SiC is working with MIND to provide mental health support for asylum seekers, refugees and volunteers. A Mental Health Support Worker, a Ukrainian refugee who specialises in trauma psychotherapy and psychology, has been providing counselling sessions for hotel residents, the weekly drop-in, women's group, and volunteers. There is a significant demand for this service.

GDPR - Data Protection Update

At this time of year your Data Protection Lead must complete certain documents, on behalf of the Managing Trustees (ie the Church Members) for District, certifying that we are all keeping our confidential Church data in an appropriate manner. Your GDPR Lead has to sign personally to say this is happening. At present this duty falls to the Senior Steward as we do not have a GDPR person. There's a lot of information available for you on the TCMP website about all this, but briefly I need to remind you that you must:

- **keep only records that you need, and keep them up-to-date**

Review the data you have. Ensure that the information about individuals is used only for the purposes for which it was collected and is kept relevant and accurate.

- **destroy records you no longer need, in a timely manner**

Where information about an individual is not required anymore it should permanently be deleted as soon as possible.

- **keep the records secure**

Make sure your software and firewall are up-to-date and install upgrades when available. Use passwords. Don't leave papers lying around where others can find them. Don't share email accounts.

- **ensure you have consent if that is what you are relying on**

If the data is held through the consent of the individual, rather than 'legitimate interest', this consent needs to be renewed after 2 years.

- **be aware of the contents of the Managing Trustees' Privacy Notice**

This is displayed in the Hall. You can find it online and print your own copy or I can send you the link.

All the above needs to be followed so I can certify that we are compliant on the 'Data Protection Annual Checklist'. There is yet another layer of bureaucracy, the 'Processor Record for Managing Trustees' which also needs to be certified and I will be doing this for 2024.
